Spokane Community Unites in Solidarity for Immigrant Workers on May Day

On May 1st, we honor May Day, celebrate the protection of workers' rights, and center immigrants, who are often the most vulnerable to workplace violations. Immigrants in the US have been systematically excluded from accessing basic rights, labor protections, and resources due to their immigration status. The people who grow and process our food, build our homes, and provide essential services deserve access to protections, healthcare, unemployment benefits, and communities that welcome and acknowledge them, treating them with the respect and dignity they deserve. We are more than just labor. We are part of the fabric of the US, Washington State, and the Spokane community.





On May Day, we marched together in solidarity with the Tenant Union, Dorothy Day Labor, Spectrum Center, League of Women Voters, Spokane 350, Muslims for Community Action & Support, Asians for Collective Liberation, Familias Unidas Por La Justicia, WAISN, WFSE, UFCW3000, Mujeres In Action, Spokane Low Income Housing Consortium, Spokane Alliance, Jewish Voice for Peace, NW Laborers, Washington State Carpenters, and Veterans for Peace. We aimed to build power, connect the intersections of our collective struggles, and stand together to demand our rights to dignified workplaces, fair wages, housing, tenant rights, safety, health, 2SLGBTQIA+ rights, and racial/immigration justice.



We honored the immigrant construction crew who tragically lost their lives on the Francis Scott Key Bridge in Baltimore:

Miguel Luna from El Salvador Alejandro Hernandez Fuentes, 35, from Mexico

Dorlian Ronial Castillo Cabrera, 26, from Guatemala

Jose Mynor Lopez from Guatemala Carlos Hernández from Mexico Maynor Suazo Sandoval from Honduras

These workers were not taking jobs or causing division; they were building bridges and safe homes, providing essential services.

As a collective, we marched to call on our state representatives, federal agencies, the city of Spokane, and the courts. As we enter a divisive political season fueled by hate, we cannot remain stagnant while our rights are being stripped away, and our communities are demonized for existing, workers are exploited, and housing continues to be unattainable. We can build power to fairly distribute wealth and resources and ensure the health and well-being of our communities. We know that when we organize, we can win! As Chief Sitting Bull once said, "They can cut off our fingers, one by one, but if we join together we will make a powerful fist."

Free Monthly Legal and Immigration Clinics

Since 2020, Latinos En Spokane has diligently organized free monthly legal and immigration clinics in partnership with Gonzaga Law School, the Spokane County Bar Association Volunteer Lawyers Program, and Washington Courts. These clinics offer free legal consultations, assistance with navigating court processes, document reviews, and court self-help services, providing crucial support to our community.

Introducing Poder Legal Department

In 2023, we launched the Poder Legal Department to provide civil and immigration legal support to low-income Latino individuals and families disproportionately affected by systemic inequalities in the legal system. Poder Legal focuses on addressing the unique legal needs of Latinos and immigrants in Eastern Washington, ensuring access to justice and resources for this underserved population. Through this initiative, we aim to empower our community by offering essential legal assistance and advocating for their rights.

Our Services

General Legal Aid: Personalized referral to legal professionals, and assistance for individuals seeking to vacate their criminal backgrounds and obtain driver relicensing.

Immigration Services: We offer family-based petitions, asylum, DACA, Victims of Crime and family violence, work permits, waivers, applying for citizenship, renewals of permanent residence, screening for various forms of immigration benefits and relief, and assistance to documented and undocumented immigrants.

Court Self-Help Services: Free court forms, printing and scanning.

FREE Notary Public Services: Authenticating essential documents to prevent fraud and ensure legal compliance.

Apple Health Expansion Now Open to Immigrants Regardless of Immigration Status

In 2022, we embarked on an ambitious mission in collaboration with the Health Benefits Exchange, Healthcare Authority, ACLU, NOLA, and WAISIN to ensure that every resident in Eastern Washington, regardless of immigration status, could enroll in health and dental insurance. From November 1st to January 15th, our team worked tirelessly to remove digital and cultural barriers, bridging access to healthcare for all.



Our Work Is Not Over! We're excited to introduce a groundbreaking initiative: Apple Health Expansion! This program marks a significant victory for immigrant families in Washington State, providing them with free medical and dental coverage. Starting June 20th, 2024, Apple Health Expansion will open doors for all qualifying undocumented immigrants, ensuring their access to essential healthcare services without financial barriers. This is a major step forward in prioritizing the health and well-being of our immigrant communities, fostering inclusivity and equity in healthcare access across the state.

Through access to resources like a shared kitchen at LES, food truck rentals, and supplies for temporary sales, Empréndete continues to empower entrepreneurs and foster economic development in our community.
